Discrimination against Roma people in Central and Eastern Europe International Research Workshop Budapest, 26–27 March 2026

The project **EqualStrength** investigates discrimination and prejudice against ethnic minorities in Europe. As part of the project, we have measured discrimination against Roma people in the labour market, the rental housing market, and access to childcare in three European countries: Hungary, Czechia and Spain (2023-2026). This workshop aims to create a forum for academic researchers and policy-oriented experts to engage in an in-depth discussion of ethnic discrimination, with a particular focus on Roma communities in Central and Eastern Europe.

The workshop will have two main strands. The first will focus on data and methodology, drawing on research evidence generated within the EqualStrength project as well as on recent research conducted in the CEE region more broadly. The second strand will focus on policy implications, based on lessons learned across different countries and institutional contexts.

We welcome both recently completed papers and work-in-progress that measure discrimination or explore the causes of discrimination against the Roma. We will give priority to papers using a quantitative approach. We will not accept project ideas or papers in a very early stage, but will have some space for non-presenting participants. Multiple papers by the same author might be accepted.

The venue is Budapest, and there is no participation fee. We can cover costs of travel and accommodation for up to 8 participants.
